Debate - Round 1

Opinion A

Overtime is important to ensure reports and **projects** are completed on-time when **workplaces** fall behind **schedule**.

It is useful to task employees with **overtime** work whenever needed.

Opinion B

Overtime is terrible because it can make workers sick, which leads to loss of **productivity**.

Overtime should be avoided for both good **management** and **employee** health.

Debate - Round 2

Opinion A

In workplaces with many **employees**, meetings are an important tool for **feedback**.

Large workplaces should have as many meetings as needed to ensure both management and employees receive consistent, reliable feedback.

Opinion B

In workplaces with many employees, meetings slow down progress on reports and projects.

Large workplaces should keep meetings to as few as possible to ensure both management and employee productivity is high.

Debate - Round 3

Opinion A

Personal relationships are important for a healthy **workplace**.

It is reasonable to expect that **employees** spend their own time doing activities together outside of work.

Opinion B

People should keep the **workplace** and private life separate.

If **employees** are expected to spend time together in activities, this should be considered **overtime**.
